Progress is being made on the 150 acre ACU campus property in Chisamba. A construction team led by Phil Bailey (Director of Haygrove Zambia) has been working on a few projects. The first project was to install a gate at the entrance to the property. Currently an addition of two bedrooms is being made to the structure built by the squatters who invaded the property last year. In addition, an ablution block and an insaka (a small hut where a fire is kept for cooking) are being constructed. This will allow the ACU caretaker, Donald Tembo, and his family to move on site.

We joyously announce the return of Logan Nyasulu to the ACU team. Logan was on the initial 2009 Working Committee formed to start ACU. He is now returning as the Vice-Chairman of the Infrastructure Committee. He aggressively jumped in to survey the Chisamba property to prepare for more detailed construction planning.

Suppose you woke up one day and decided that you wanted to see how Christians set themselves apart in their field of work. You might begin by looking at the Christian musical artist, who seeks to fill her songs with beautiful flows of musical cadence, harmony and lyrics that edify the listener. You could look at the Christian who is a banker, and

how he seeks to build a reputation of integrity and honesty in his financial transactions. You might even look at the farmer, who seeks to work faithfully in his fields, cultivating and stewarding his crops and caring for his animals. However, when it comes to the sphere of mathematics, you may have to look closely to find what sets apart a Christian from an unbeliever.

To properly understand "Christian" mathematics, one must also have a definition of what mathematics is. Over time, the definition and purpose of mathematics has evolved as the discipline has changed. Some would say that mathematics is simply a *tool* that can be used in real life situations to quantitatively relate abstract ideas to real world problems. Others define it

as a language used to discuss abstract ideas of quantitative relations. Still others would explain that it is an art form that mysteriously relates the real world to the abstract. While all of these brief definitions are true in their own sense, they all leave out a vital part of the equation; they leave out the Author of mathematics.

How does our Creator fit into the picture? First off, we know that God "upholds the universe by the word of his power" (Hebrews 1:3 ESV). That "...by him all things were created, in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible,...all things were created through him and for him." (Colossians 1:16 ESV). This would include the applicable and abstract realms of mathematics. To deeply and uniquely understand the purpose and beauty of mathematics, we must understand that it came about, not by man's cleverness and reasoning, but rather by God's perfect plan, will and creativeness.

When God is revealed as the foundation of mathematics, the convoluted human attempts at defining the purpose of mathematics can be synthesised into one definition that rests under God's creativeness. For example, the connection between real world problems and abstract answers can be holistically understood as God's handiwork in action. A clearer picture emerges as to why the mathematical tools that we use in



physics and engineering can also be used to explain the foundations of music. It is because it is all under God's holistic plan and it reflects His truth and orderliness in His creation.




Christian Education Offers Hope By Ray Warwick, ACU Academic Dean

From what I read on the site, it seems that we are here in Zambia starting ACU because we hate the Africans and want to corrupt their brains and ruin their lives. Yawn! (Hmmmm, I wonder if my friends in Uganda and Zambia feel that way about my presence here.) I think it odd that people who have never met us, do not know us, and **do not live here** know so much about our attitudes and motives. (Admittedly, it is a little embarrassing that we have to practically beg many Christians to assist us with the finances and manpower needed to start a Christian university in Africa. The atheists, apparently, are fully aware of this reality!)

I was somewhat amused by Ken Turnbull's response to all of this. He was thrilled that we are being noticed by the dedicated enemies of God. We must be doing something right! But I declared that I would not give these "haters" (their word) another thought. Since you are reading this article, you can see that I was wrong.

Many Christians are familiar with the scripture, "The fool says in his heart, "There is no God," (Psalm 14:1; 53:1 ESV) and are rather quick to recite it
