



e destroy arguments and every lofty opinion raised against the knowledge of God, and take every thought captive to obey Christ (2 Cor 10:5)." One reason that the knowledge of God is so precious to the Christian is because it is in our mind where our actions originate. If we have minds transformed in Christ, then we will obey Christ in what we do. In this issue of the ACU Monthly Prayer Update we look at the foundation upon which holistic education can be realized - education which impacts what we do in practice, not just our intellect. We also learn about Rob McDonald, another candidate who is considering serving through the Student Labor Program, where applying God's Word to practice is exercised. Thank you for taking time to understand and pray for the needs of ACU so that our heavenly Father may be glorified as you approach His throne in the name of Jesus.

Foundation for Holistic Education by Dr. Ken Turnbull

In the September, 2012 issue of the ACU Monthly Prayer Update the erosion of education was addressed. The core source of that erosion was summarized as the secular attempt to separate God from the reality of our existence which results in a very non-holistic approach to knowledge. The non-holistic nature of knowledge when God's existence is negated



was seen in the inability to correlate knowledge with morality or values. Education must affect behavior - what we do in practice. Knowledge that doesn't inform practice is not holistic. Education must therefore return to reality where knowledge exists only in the context of the God who creates and defines reality. It is God who ultimately allots knowledge to mankind (Psa 94:10, Pro 2:6). Even by His common grace God allows fallen humans to be blessed by the fruit of gaining knowledge (Rom 1:19-20). God in His grace does this even though sin brings all mankind under God's wrath, thereby deserving only eternal death (Rom 6:23, 2 Pet 2:4-10). But knowledge disconnected from God is inexcusable (Rom 1:20), leading to debased minds producing dishonoring acts in the

Matters of Praise

She will be working at a local hospital amongst other projects and will help ACU to initiate medical outreach and educational programs. May the Lord smooth the way for her

In other words, a Christian's belief in God affords them knowledge of truth which produces in them the practice of righteousness. This knowledge of truth comes through the Christian's redemption in Christ (1 Cor 2:12, 16) through whom the Christian might become the righteousness of God (2 Cor 5:21). This is the foundation for holistic education. Redemption in Christ unites knowledge to practice. Through faith by Christ comes knowledge in Christ leading towards the righteousness of Christ. Thus, holistic education must be education that is centered on Christ, and the fruit of such education should be knowledge which stimulates acts of righteousness in practice.

Roderick McDonald (Rod), a friend of the Turnbulls from Christ Fellowship Church in Kansas City, Missouri, and a long-time prayer partner and supporter of ACU, recently spent three weeks in Zambia. Rod has been drawn to the ACU work as it is clearly distinct from secular education. He asserts that for him the draw is to, "a model of a university as described by Dr. Turnbull that is informed by Puritan concepts where branches of knowledge are not compartmentalized and
