Spirit within us) through the study of form, then we improve at the art of organizing well. Thus, God's glory is demonstrated in our lives as we grow in our sanctification in well organized knowledge. As we grow in our fundamental knowledge base (i.e., grammar) of each academic discipline. it is demonstrated in our practice of knowing well, or our intelligence. This too allows us to glorify God as the Holy Spirit continues to transform us in Christ through the knowledge of God. Likewise, we grow in better applying that knowledge base in the way we think logically, a further expression of God's sanctifying work in us. One can continue around this circle of practice to see how our growing knowledge leads to a demonstrable outcome in the way we live.

Lastly, an important addition to this philosophy of education counters the fallen tendency for knowledge to "puff up" the learner with a self-focused pride (a form of idolatry). The antidote to this is love. In this regard, the Holy Spirit can be seen as a 4-pronged bridge from the inner circle of our relationship with God and His creation through Christ, to the resultant practice of righteousness as we are sanctified and grow in knowledge through loving God. As Jesus affirmed (Mark 12:30), we must love God with all of our heart (our emotional capacity), our soul (our spiritual capacity), our mind (our intellectual capacity) and our strength (our physical capacity in work and leisure). This is where the whole person, created in God's image, is fully engaged in learning that matures/perfects.

This education philosophy is an expression of the redemption of Christ working through us, reconciling us to God as the mind is being renewed and the individual transformed to a better understanding of God and His will in what is good and acceptable and perfect (Rom 12:2). This is the fruit of righteousness that holistic education, centered upon redemption in Christ, should propagate in a learner's life who is being transformed by the Spirit of God. This is holistic education that nourishes true transformation.

## An Example of Holistic Education by Dr. Ken Turnbull

In this third installment on Christian education we will pick up from the foundation for holistic education put forward in the October, 2012 ACU Prayer Update. We examined how the Scripture supports that redemption in Christ unites knowledge with practice. This is the foundation for a holistic education centered on Christ which produces the fruit of righteousness in the way one lives. The question is, how is this accomplished in education? Let's examine an example where such a philosophy was successfully applied

in higher education. The renown 17th century English scholar John Milton wrote (in old English), "The end then of learning is to repair the ruins of our first parents by regaining to know God aright, and out of that knowledge to love him, to be like him, as we may the neerest by possessing our souls of true vertue, which being united to the heavenly grace of faith makes up the highest perfection" (in "Of Education").



Harvard's 1st Shield

Puritan approach to holistic education upon which Harvard was founded applied such works as John Alsted's "Encyclopedism" and William Ames' "Technometry" in a Christcentered approach to education.\* This has been modified in a manner that would more closely fit the context of ACU. According

to Figure 1 (diagram shown pg. 3), Christ is at the center of education. The next laver from the center displays man's interaction with God and His creation through Christ. This is our spiritual regeneration in Christ that reconciles us to God so that we might know Him (which includes understanding His Word) and His creation. Our relationship with Him is expressed in all we do, as our life is our art displaying His glory.

The following concentric layer progresses from man's expressive relationship with God and His creation through Christ and presents our growth in knowledge through academic studies. The Puritan's called this the encyclopedia of knowledge, representing a progressive growth in our knowledge of God, man and creation. The initial step (the 1 o'clock position in Figure 1) has been added to the original Puritan model to express development in understanding form, or structuring knowledge, such as in information organization through computer technology. This foundational level of

organizing or systematizing knowledge leads to understanding of the fundamental language of every academic discipline: the grammar level of knowledge. Applying knowledge of the fundamental grammar components of each discipline (the terminology and fundamental structure of a discipline) requires proper thinking or logic. And being able to communicate the logical thoughts clearly is rhetoric.

Continuing around the second half of the encyclopedic, academic development in knowledge incorporates mathematics - the order and structure which is fundamental to

God's character expressed throughout His creation. From here humanity can access the further intricacies of His creation, an expression of His invisible attributes (Rom 1:20), through science in the discovery of His creative designs. These discoveries prosper man's creative expression of his knowledge through the talents of which we are endowed as God's image bearers through the practice of art, where, for example, music would be the highest expression of mathematics. The highest form of our advancing knowledge of God then comes through theology, developed particularly through His direct revelation in Scripture, founding our knowledge of God, man and creation. This completes the encyclopedia of knowledge, but it is not yet an expression of holistic education.

It is the impact on practice - what we do in life, or our behavior - that is the expression of the righteousness imputed to us through Christ which expresses our true knowledge of God, or better, being known by God. This is the final outer layer of Figure 1 that expresses the impact of each area of development on what we do in practice. So, as our knowledge of God expands (that in itself being a work of the Holy


